




One night, Moe notices Bertie the Albertosaurus is missing. Where could she be?











Moe wants to know.




It's not Bertie, but someone's hiding in here.







It might be helpful if Moe had a picture of Bertie. Draw your own Albertosaurus.











Oh my! Some of the bugs have escaped. Put them back in their cases.

Use this space to draw, colour and name your bug.




Draw and colour the rest of the wasp.




Ants are amozing and smart.

There's even a tipi!


If you lived in a tipi what would it look like?



Fur trappers used to put fancy blankets on their dogs.




The Métis made Red River Carts out of wood and rawhide. They were squeaky but strong.




Costume Draw yourself riding the horse. ideas: Yee-haw! Giddy-up!

Curious facts.

- Pg. 2 The new Royal Alberta Museum (RAM) is home to more than 2.5 million objects.
- Pg. 3 As far as we know, there are no such things as dinosaur robbers, or all-dinosaur nightclubs.
- Pg. 4 The biplane is named Edmonton. It belonged to Wilfrid "Wop" May, a First World War flying ace, bush pilot and Canadian aviation pioneer.
- Pg.5 The "finger-hole rock" is classified as a concretion. It was among the earliest specimens added to RAM's geology collection.
- Pq.6 The creature hiding is an Edmontosaurus.



- Pg. 7 Bertie is an Albertosaurus sarcophagus. It was a top predator when it walked the earth around 70 million years ago.
- Pg. 10 There are 11 black ant-shaped inlays in the floor that lead into the Bug Gallery.
- Pg. 10 The "red Bug on the wall" is a 1968 Volkswagen Beetle mounted in the Children's Gallery.
- Pg. 17 Dog blankets were beautifully beaded and embroidered and fur trappers would put them on their dogs before visiting a fort.
- Pg. 18 The earliest Red River Carts had no metal parts, not even nails. They were really durable and easy to fix.
- Pg. 19 Children can ride the horse when they visit the Human History Hall.
- Pg. 20 The "Big Machine" is a huge mechanical toy that moves rubber crumb.
- Pg.20 The "blowy thing" is a wind machine that you can use to make things float high into the air.
